Christmas Eve Day & New Year's Day

Since the Eve of the Nativity of Christ is on Sunday, December 24, there will only be a Divine Liturgy held at 10:30 a.m. There will be no services on Christmas Eve and on Christmas Day. On Monday, December 25, the sanctuary will be open from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

On Sunday, December 31, there will be an artoklasia service at the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy. Please bring names of the living to be read during the service.

New Year's Day, Monday, January 1, is the feast day of the Circumcision of Our Lord, God and Saviour Jesus Christ and Saint Basil the Great. This also is the name day of our church. The sanctuary will be open from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.



Hope Presbyterian Church

After years of declining membership and financial difficulties, Hope Presbyterian Church, 518 LeRay Street, Watertown, held its final service on September 24. Since November 19, 1896, Hope Presbyterian Church was known as the "beacon on the hill", and at one time was a very active congregation.

The building is owned by the Presbytery of Northern New York in Ogdensburg, and it is shared with the Watertown Korean Presbyterian Church. It is anticipated that the Korean Presbyterian Church will take over and maintain the building.

There are two other Presbyterian churches in the city of Watertown: First Presbyterian Church and Stone Presbyterian Church. We offer our prayers that the members of Hope Presbyterian Church find peace and strength during this time of change.



Saint Dionysius, the Holy Hierarch FEAST DAY: SUNDAY, DECEMBER 17

The holy hierarch, Saint Dionysius, was born in 1547 and reared on Zakynthos, Greece, a Greek island in the Ionian Sea. He was the son of pious and wealthy parents, Moicus and Paulina. As a youth, he entered the ancient monastery of the Strophada Islands, which are south of Zakynthos and was clothed in the monastic habit. Although he was young, he surpassed many of his elders in virtue and was soon ordained to the holy priesthood. He later was consecrated the Bishop of Aegina, and many were drawn to him in order to learn from his wisdom. Saint Dionysius feared the praise of men and the sin of excessive pride, so he resigned

from his position and returned to Zakynthos.

In 1579 the Diocese of Zakynthos was without a bishop, Saint Dionysius agreed to care for it until a new bishop could be elected. Thereafter, he fled the worldly life as it did not bring him peace, and he went to the Monastery of the Most Holy Theotokos Anaphonitria.

Thereafter, an incident had occurred that revealed his Christ-like virtues. A certain stranger had murdered Saint Dionysius' brother Constantine, an illustrious nobleman. Fearing his victim's relatives, the stranger, by chance or by God's will, sought refuge in the monastery where Saint Dionysius was an abbot. When Saint Dionysius had asked the fugitive why he was so frightened, he confessed his sin and revealed the name of the man whom he had murdered. He asked him to be protected for the family was seeking vengeance. Saint Dionysius wept for his only brother, and then showing great compassion and love, he comforted the murderer and hid him.

Saint Dionysius' relatives along with armed men soon came to the monastery and told him what happened. He did not reveal the murderer and then sent them off in the wrong direction. He later told the murderer that he was the brother of the man he had killed. Saint Dionysius warned him of the gravity of his sin and brought him to repentance. He forgave the murderer and helped him to escape to another place so that his life might be saved. According to local tradition, this man later returned to the monastery and became a monk.

Saint Dionysius was granted the gift of working miracles because of his Christ-like virtues. He reposed in peace on December 17, 1621, leaving behind his sacred, incorrupt and miraculous relics. Through the prayers of Saint Dionysius, may Christ our God have mercy upon us all. An icon of Saint Dionysius, the Holy Hierarch, is displayed in the sanctuary during the month of December.



Travels to Greece

During the summer *Chris and Margaret Theodore*, their son and daughter-in-law, *James and Abbe Theodore*, and their children, *Grace and Christos*, traveled to Greece to visit relatives and to view historical sites. The photograph below was submitted by Abbe Theodore and depicts one of the Monasteries of Meteora. These gigantic rocks are perched above the town of Kalambaka near the plains of Thessaly in central Greece and are at a height of approximately 1,200 feet.

The monasteries were built by the monks, and it took years to construct them at the top of the rocks. They used ropes, folding ladders, nets and baskets along with much faith, determination and fortitude. During the Ottoman Empire or at the time of the Turkish occupation of Greece, these monasteries kept alive our religious practices, Hellenic culture and academia.

Meteora means "hovering in the air." Today there are only six active monasteries. The Meteroa monasteries have been included in the UNESCO (United Nations, Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization) World Heritage listing.
