
The Life of Saint Panteleimon Great Martyr and Healer Commemorated on Sunday, July 27

Saint Panteleimon of Nicomedia was the son of Eustorgius and Eubula. His father was an idolater, but his mother was a Christian. It was through his mother that he was instructed in piety. He was catechized and baptized in the Faith of Christ by Saint Hermolaos whose feast day is on July 26. Saint Panteilmon was proficient in the physician's vocation, and he practiced it in a philanthropic manner, healing every illness more by the grace of Christ than by medicines. Although his parents had named him Pantoleon ("in all things a lion"), he was renamed Panteleimon ("all merciful") because of the compassion he showed for others.

On one occasion when he restored the sight of a blind man by calling on God, he also enlightened the eyes of this man's soul to the knowledge of the truth. This became the cause of martyrdom for the blind man. When he was asked by whom and by what manner had his eyes been opened, he imitated the blind man in the Gospel and confessed with boldness

who the physician was and the manner of the healing (John 9:1-38).

This gospel is read on the 5th Sunday following Pascha. For this he was put to death immediately. Saint Panteleimon was also arrested and subsequently, had endured many wounds for his pronouncement of Jesus Christ as Lord. He was beheaded in the year 305 during the reign of Roman Emperor, Maximian.



General Assembly Meeting

The General Assembly Meeting that was scheduled for Sunday, June 22 at 11:30 a.m. was cancelled due to the lack of a quorum. It will be rescheduled for Saturday, August 2, following the Divine Liturgy at 11:45 a.m. A severe thunderstorm had struck the region early that Sunday morning with high winds, heavy rain and cloud to ground lightning causing several power outages even in neighborhoods near the church. There was tree damage in various sections of the city and several power poles were toppled. The church sustained some light accumulation of water in some areas of the basement. There was no damage to the exterior of church and parish house or on the grounds surrounding both buildings.

Future of the Parish

This is a very challenging time for our parish. For several decades we had Divine Liturgies conducted on most Sunday mornings. With the departure of Father Philip Yanulis nearly one year ago, a Divine Liturgy conducted by Father Peter Irfan of Amherst, New York, near Buffalo, was provided nearly once per month until Easter/Pascha. Father Irfan is now temporarily assigned to the Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church in Buffalo. He is with the Orthodox Church in America. There is a shortage of Greek Orthodox priests and Father Yanulis was reassigned to Vestal, New York which is near Binghamton. Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church in Binghamton will soon be closing and has been in a holding pattern for many years. Therefore, the Annunciation Greek Orthodox Church will be serving the parishioners in that region of the state.

Monetary donations and annual dues are very much needed and are most appreciated. The continued operation of church is dependent on your physical presence and financial support.

Prayer Service

Some parishioners have asked about what takes place during a prayer service? There is an Order of Service distributed to congregants which consists of Opening Words (a few details may be stated about the liturgical time of the year), the Doxology, the Hymn of Saint Vasilios are sung, the Nicene Creed and the Lord's Prayer are recited in Greek and English, Epistle and Gospel readings which are pertinent to the Sunday and other feast days are read and at the end of the service there is a Benediction / Closing Words. There is time allotted for questions about the parish.

A service lasts approximately 30 minutes and is held every two weeks. Light refreshments are served in the church hall each time. These services are not a substitute for a Divine Liturgy but offer a time to gather together and to remember our Greek Orthodox Faith and our community especially in the absence of a priest. The next Divine Liturgy will held on Saturday, August 2 at 10:30 a.m. Father David Smith, parish priest of Saint Sophia's Church in Syracuse, will be officiating.

Easter Greek Pastry

The Easter Greek Pastry and Bread Sale was held on Saturday, April 12. Partly sunny skies and cool temperatures persisted throughout much of the day. At 8:30 a.m. there were nearly 50 customers lined up at the lower front door of the church. There were approximately 125 customers that had come to the sale. The sale ended at 3:00 p.m. At the customer's requests, some orders were prepared in advance. The revenue generated from the sale is \$4,564.05 less \$900.00 for expenses, yielding a profit of \$3,664.05. Although an Ingredients Fund is not solicited for the Easter Sale, there were approximately \$400.00 that was donated for the costs of ingredients. The price of Tsoureki was increased from \$8.00 to \$9.00. Thank you to all that assisted with preparations and the sale of the pastries and bread.


